KFUO Radio Internet Streaming — \$50,000

Technology has broadened our capabilities to broadcast the Gospel to the entire world. KFUO, the LCMS owned and operated AM & FM broadcast radio sta-



tion, has kept on the leading edge of this technology, using it to touch the lives of people around the world with the saving message of the forgiveness in Jesus alone.

With the growth of the Internet, our LCMS radio station has been able to “live stream” programs to missionaries, laypeople, pastors, and even unbelievers. KFUO is one of the industry leaders using Pod casts to make available anytime archived programs and Bible studies free to its listeners.

A grant of \$50,000 helps KFUO reach the ends of the earth with the Gospel of Jesus.



Isaiah 49 — Preparing for Service in Child Welfare – Concordia University, Texas — \$80,000

Children are precious gifts from God, yet in this world of sin these gifts can be abused and neglected. A large number of children are in the child welfare system, hoping to find refuge there given by professional caring workers.

There is a need for more workers in public and private agencies serving these vulnerable children. Concordia University, Texas, seeks to fill that need through the Isaiah 49 project, which creates opportunities for students from across the Concordia University system

to be placed as interns with various agencies, such as Lutheran Social Services, Casey Family Programs, and the Arrow Project, serving children who are in need.

An \$80,000 grant supports the Isaiah 49 project at Concordia University, Texas.



Deaf Lay and Clergy Training – Concordia Seminary, St. Louis — \$50,000

What will you do? You cannot hear the pastor talk. You cannot hear your own father teach you. How do you proclaim the Gospel and teach the Bible in a way Deaf people can understand? Many Deaf people do not believe in Jesus and may not have had the opportunity to learn of Him.

The Deaf Institute of Theology has the dream and the challenge to give Deaf people the tools and training to grow in His Word. Since Deaf people know the culture and language, they are the best to reach, equip, and train other Deaf people.

The Deaf Institute of Theology at Concordia Seminary–St. Louis and Deaf Lutheran Missions needs support to train the Deaf through classes, DVDs, and other training materials.

A \$50,000 grant supports the outreach and training of Deaf lay leaders and pastors.
